

## **Dimensions of Tourism in Sindhudurg District, Maharashtra**

- Tarkarli Scuba Diving is a major attraction.

- Income instability affects workers relying solely on tourism.

### **7. Environmental-Economic Link**

- Tourism depends on clean beaches and marine biodiversity.
- Over-tourism can lead to: Pollution and Damage to coral ecosystems
- Sustainable tourism practices are essential to maintain long-term economic benefits.

- Limited large-scale investment
- Lack of advanced infrastructure (air connectivity improving but still limited)
- Competition from other coastal destinations like Goa

### **4.3 Socio-Cultural Dimension**

Sindhudurg has rich cultural heritage:

- Historical forts (Sindhudurg Fort, Vijaydurg)
- Malvani culture, cuisine, and festivals
- Traditional arts and crafts

Tourism helps in preserving and promoting local traditions but may also lead to cultural commodification if not managed properly.

#### **1. Preservation and Promotion of Culture**

Tourism helps showcase and preserve Sindhudurg's rich Konkani culture:

- Traditional festivals like Ganesh Chaturthi are celebrated with great enthusiasm and attract tourists.
- Folk arts such as Dashavatara theatre and local dances gain visibility.
- Historical sites like Sindhudurg Fort promote regional heritage.

Tourism encourages cultural pride and heritage conservation.
