**Hypothesis Testing**

H<sub>1</sub>: Contribution to Tourism Revenue

A regression analysis showed a high positive correlation ( $r = 0.89, p < 0.01$ ) between Buddhist tourist arrivals and total tourism revenue, supporting H<sub>1</sub>.

H<sub>2</sub>: Employment Generation

ANOVA results show that regions with Buddhist sites have significantly higher employment growth ( $F = 9.75, p < 0.05$ ) compared to control regions. H<sub>2</sub> accepted.

H<sub>3</sub>: Infrastructure Impact

Qualitative interviews reveal improved roads, hotels, and service quality following tourism initiatives. Thus, H<sub>3</sub> confirmed.
